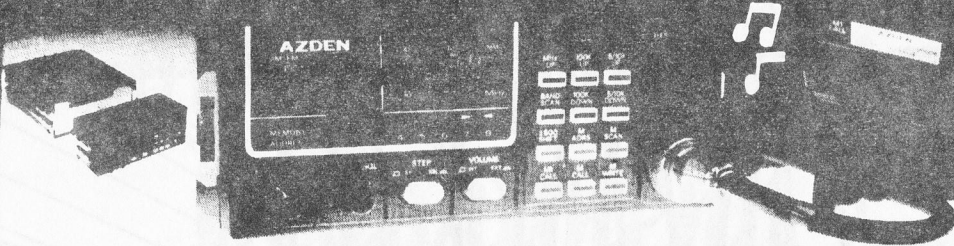

Breast of Chicken Cordon Bleu \$8.50

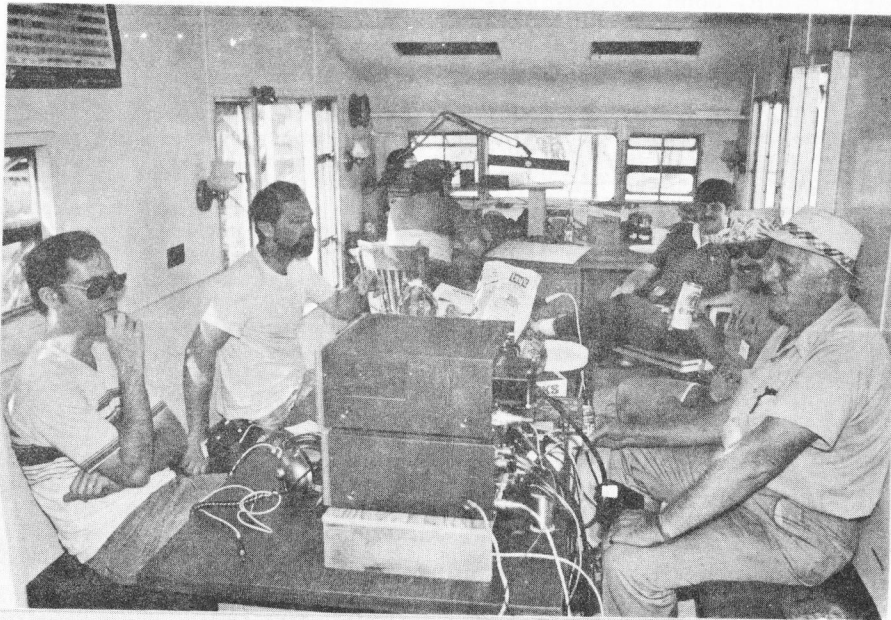
If you want to participate in the gift exchange, bring a gift, value not to exceed \$2.50, for an OM, YL, XYL, as appropriate.

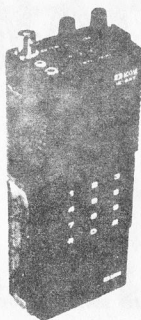

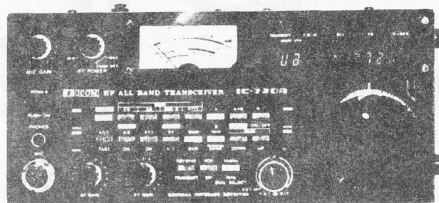
