# Using Piezoelectric Material as a Radiating Element for VLF Communications Mark Kemp

VLF transmitters have been successfully used for many decades for long-range, over the horizon communications. However, producing a portable transmitter is very difficult because the scale of the transmitter is several orders of magnitude smaller than the electromagnetic wavelength. As part of the DARPA AMEBA program, SLAC, SRI, and Gooch and Housego are working to apply a piezoelectric material as a radiating element. This concepts allows the transmitter and antenna to be resonant at the acoustic wavelength and therefore no external impedance matching elements are necessary. Further, an ultra-low loss single crystal of lithium niobate is used as the piezoelectric, and Qs up to 600,000 are demonstrated. Finally, we demonstrate a bandwidth 83x beyond the Bode-Fano limit by dynamically modulating the crystal resonant frequency. This talk will discuss the concept, recent experiments, and next steps for the program.

Mark Kemp is a Senior Staff Scientist at SLAC National Accelerator Laboratory. He is the PI of several early stage R&D programs funded through DARPA, DoE, and DHS. He was the project manager for the baseline power modulator for the International Linear Collider. He invented a technique for a self biasing pulsed depressed collector for high power vacuum electronics as well as an ultra compact neutron generator using piezo electrics. He was the technical and general conference chair for the IEEE International Power Modulator and High Voltage Conference. He received his BS,MS, and PhD in Electrical and Computer Engineering from the University of Missouri.

Board Meeting was a great success.

For once I had a smooth pair of flights into Bradley International, and was whisked away to the Windsor Marriott. This hotel has become very familiar to me now. It's where we hold the ARRL Board meetings twice a year. This time, however, I arrived early, on Tuesday night, to attend committee meetings. The Board meeting doesn't really start until Thursday evening. On Wednesday morning I got up for the 7:30 AM shuttle to ARRL HQ, but ended up riding instead with New England Division Vice Director Mike Raisbeck, K1TWF. I was headed to the Logbook Of The World Committee meeting. It was my first time meeting some of the staff in person. We had a healthy discussion of

### Volunteerism

One dictionary description of volunteerism is, "the practice of doing work for good causes, without being paid for it." Another is, "the practice of providing time and skills for the benefit of other people and causes rather than for financial benefit." Society views volunteerism as "enriching our society, bringing us together as a community, and helps keep businesses and organizations afloat".

Bringing us together as a community and keeping organizations afloat has a direct correlation to clubs as well. Without volunteers to fill the needs of the club, the club dies. The challenge is to garner the interest of enough members to do the work of the club so a small percentage of the members don't end up doing all the work of the club and in turn, the club thrives.

How does PAARA fare? Currently, there are 218 members. Of them, there are roughly 24 volunteers or 11% of the member's volunteer. These numbers don't include all the members and nonmembers that help during Field Day but do include the leadership team of Field Day. Not bad one might say but one needs to factor in that there are roughly 100 volunteer activities that the 24 volunteers cover! That averages out to roughly 4 activity per volunteer! One also has to consider that currently there are 9 activities that don't have a volunteer and another 5 that are in need of a new volunteer. Eliminating the 9 open activities from the total leaves 91 that are currently filled to one degree or another bringing the average per current volunteer to 3.78 activities each.

Averages are fine but the reality is a bit different as the number of activities covered by those 24 volunteers ranges from 1 to 14! Currently, there are 8 members (3% of the total members who cover 4 or more activities). They are covering 56 of the activities (61% of the 91 covered activities) of the club for an average of 7 per volunteer! That's a sizable number of activities covered by a very small number of volunteers.

One has to wonder what's going on with these 8? Why are they volunteering so much? Do they feel compelled to cover important activities of the club that another volunteer can't be found to cover? Are they getting something out of volunteer-

ing that the other members don't see or don't know they could enjoy? Is the volunteer's enjoyment of PAARA and amateur radio so much stronger than the non-volunteer? All great questions with many different answers for each volunteer. If you're at all interested in finding out the answers, might I suggest talking to one of the 8? If you don't know who they are, ask as it's not hard to figure out who they are.

Being a member of a club to keep your interest in the hobby alive, share you experiences with others, or to learn from others different aspects of the hobby is a great reason for joining. Without a doubt, amateur radio has so many avenues to explore with respect to bands, modes, methods, antennas, radios, contesting, Ecom, DX and many more. Being a member of a club that doesn't specialize in any one of the areas opens one's eyes to other opportunities to explore within the hobby. Additional gratification can be garnered by volunteering for an activity for the good of the club.

Why do you come to the meetings? To meet new people or see old friends? To learn something new? To get that challenging question answered? Do you go away from a meeting feeling a little more energized with a bit of skip in your step? The similar thing happens when you volunteer for one of the activities of the club. The only difference is, the skip you give is to other club members and yourself. You're impacting the whole club and its members with your volunteerism! Consider joining the force of the few. Believe me, the force is stronger when there are many hands making light work of things! There is a wide array of activities that need a volunteer champion each with varying degrees of effort required. Many of the activities could use a second volunteer to share the workload or to cover for the other volunteer.

Speaking as one of the 8, we look forward to increasing the numbers of volunteers through your participation. PAARA is a very strong club that has a great reputation amongst others in the ham community. This reputation didn't happen by accident but through the hard work of a few dedicated volunteers. Please consider volunteering, the club needs your support.

#### Club Calls

Hi - nice club web site. I noticed the comment there that you weren't sure just how far back the club had W6OTX. We had W6OTX and K6YQT back in 1967-1968. We were in an RV<sub>I</sub> trailer in (as I recall) Menlo Park and had a vellow Gonset Communicator with a CD decal on it, a two-meter beam on the trailer, and an old WW-II surplus ART-13 that had not yet been I set up to work (although it was fascinating to) watch all the servo motors run around, HI). I don't remember what else was in there. That's a LONG time ago now. I lived on Bellair Way in Menlo Park, which is West of the Alameda on the road up into Sharon Heights. I started out with WW-II surplus stuff, and ended up with a used Heathkit DX-100 with an SB-10 sideband adapter I got from Quement Electronics in San Jose. I got my Tech in May '67, General in August '67 and Advanced in December '67, all at the FCC S.F. Field Office. I was able to get us some surplus Western Union teleprinters, and when I had to move back East in '68 I donated all that and some antennas, etc., to the Club, L hope someone was able to use it.

Our PAARA Field Days were up on top of the Coastal Range, with that RV trailer, surplus generators on skids, and other stuff. It was quite an operation. The nighttime view was beautiful with the whole Bay Area in view. I assume we made a good many 2 meter AM contacts with that Gooney Box, but I honestly don't remember at this point.

I got my Tech in May '67, Gen. 8/67, Adv. 12/67. My call then was WB6WLH. I was in PAARA '67-'68, - had to move East when my Dad was transferred. He was the Director of Engineering for Sierra Electronics '60-'68 (it was a subsidiary of Philco/Ford) and was transferred to the Apollo effort at Goddard Space Flight Center (GSFC) Greenbelt MD in Fall 1968.

I am a '67 grad of WHS . I ended up working at NASA GSFC also (not for Philco/Ford) on Communications for Apollo 13/14/15. Even met Neil Armstrong there when he came by one day to

the state of LOTW, followed by some thoughts on how to get more resources for improvements. We talked about what might be done in the future, as well as how to implement some best practices that the software industry uses. 




